'Transformed Lives' -- that is what the *poda-poda* (public transport van) I saw yesterday was called. While I am sure an argument could be made for the fact that riding a *poda-poda* will in fact change your life, it's not the quite the kind of transformation that we talk about at CRWRC. I wanted to share with you a bit more about the transformation we pray for and desire to see -- here is a quote that sums it up well:

"The 'transformation' we seek in communities is as deep as the human heart, and as broad as the whole range of the human experience in the world God made. We want our approach to faithfully declare that our God reigns; Jesus is Lord over every inch of creation. 'From him and through him and to him are all things.' (Rom 11:36) We want to do community development that reflects the depth and breadth of the Kingdom."

As most of you know I am in the process wrapping up my

time here in Sierra Leone and moving to Nigeria to work with one of CRWRC's partners there, Beacon of Hope. Beacon of Hope works in partnership with several churches in Nigeria to see this kind of transformation happen at the community level, particularly by helping communities respond to the HIV and AIDS pandemic.
