

# Introduction to the 40-Day Prayer Guide

- Returning to Jerusalem

As we pray through these themes, I pray that you may experience the presence of God through the prayers written by CRC missionaries, pastors, staff, and various members young and old—in many languages and with English translations—reflecting the beautiful diversity of the CRC.

### Prayer



... But we had hoped that he was the one who was going to redeem Israel. And what is more, it is the third day since all this took place.

### Prayer

Forgiving Father, we can be a people who feel the ache of unfulfilled hopes. Discouragements and setbacks and unfulfilled hopes take their toll on our faith. Some of us even stop hoping altogether. Here are some of the things we had hoped for . . . (list a few of your unfulfilled hopes and dreams).

We pray for the discouraged members of the CRC and for all whose faces are downcast. Meet us on the road, Lord Jesus, as you met Cleopas and his companion. Listen to our laments and show us a glimpse of the bigger vision you


have for Christian Reformed churches, the CRCNA, and your universal church throughout the world.

Remind us again that even though Cleopas and his companion thought their hopes were dashed, their wildest hopes and imaginings had been fulfilled. But they did not know it yet. May this encourage us to be a people of hope again. We ask that you would grant wisdom, discernment, and hope to the delegates to Synod 2025.

Thank you for your sacrifice and love. Lord, as you showed up on the road to disciples who felt abandoned by your journey to the cross—who asked, "How long, Lord? Will you forget me forever?"—thank you for showing up for us now.


Thank you that even when we feel forgotten and marginalized, you are ever present—open our eyes to see this reality. Thank you for proclaiming your good news to us—the poor, the prisoners, and the oppressed—and for giving sight to the blind, that we may see your glory and bask in your love (Luke 4).

Help us to internalize your call in word and deed and strengthen us to do the good works that you have prepared in advance for us to do (Ephesians 2:10). May we live and work in accord with your will and receive your glory so that the world will know you were sent by the Father (John 17:21) as they see us all becoming one (v. 22).

Open our eyes to see your presence in the lives of others. May the poor be blessed (Matthew 5), the distressed comforted, the hungry fed, and the persecuted enfolded into your kingdom, even here on earth. Thank you for placing this kingdom in us—in our midst (Luke 17:21)—by the power of your Holy Spirit!

We give you all our praise and worship, even as we humbly bow before you. You reign supreme over all creation, including your church, for you are Lord over the church.



I am of the Navajo, or Diné, tribe from the southwest area of the United States and reside in Shiprock, N.Mex., which is about 40 miles from the Four Corners (where New Mexico, Colorado, Utah, and Arizona meet). My clans are Tá'chii'nii (Red Running into the Water), Kinyaa'áanii (Towering House), ÁshWWhí (Salt), and Naakai Diné'é (Mexican).


