

A veces, la vida puede sentirse agobiante. Ya sea por las demandas del ministerio, las presiones del trabajo o las luchas personales, a menudo llevamos cargas que parecen demasiado pesadas. Nos agotamos física, emocional y espiritualmente. Pero en medio de nuestro cansancio, el Salmo 121:3-4 nos recuerda una verdad hermosa: Dios nunca duerme.


Life can feel overwhelming at times. Whether it's the demands of ministry, the pressures of work, or personal struggles, we often carry burdens that seem too heavy to bear. Fatigue sets in, and we find ourselves drained—physically, emotionally, and spiritually. But in the midst of our exhaustion, Psalm 121:3-4 offers a beautiful reminder: God never sleeps.

Unlike us, God does not grow weary. He does not take breaks or become distracted. His watchful eyes are always on us, ensuring that we do not stumble beyond his reach. Even when we feel alone or uncertain, God is actively sustaining us, guiding our steps, and keeping us steady. This truth invites us to rest in him. We don't have to carry everything on our own. We can lay our burdens at God's feet, knowing that he is in control. When we sleep, he is still working. When we feel weak, he remains strong.

Today, take comfort in God's unwavering presence. Trust that he is watching over us, protecting us, and leading us forward. We are never forgotten, never unseen, and never without his care. Rest in the truth that the One who holds us never closes his eyes.


God, I give you thanks every time I remember the people, organizations, and churches who partner in the gospel. . . .

Lord, in our pain and doubt, we often forget that you are walking with us. Open our eyes to your presence as you walk beside us on our journey, even when the path is difficult.


